Preparing Western Kentucky for Southern Rust in Corn

Western Kentucky will receive rainfall from tropical storm Beryl this week, and there are concerns that this storm will bring with it an unwanted disease, southern rust of corn, caused by the fungus Puccinia polysora. This fungus does not overwinter in Kentucky, and spores blow north each year on wind and storms.

Population levels vary from year to year, but Kentucky can count on higher levels of intensity and damage as the growing season moves into August and September.



Loss of Effective Soybean Phytophthora Root and Stem Rot Resistance Genes

Phytophthora root and stem rot (PRSR) of soybean is caused by Phytophthora sojae, which is an oomycete (a.k.a. water mold – not a fungus).
Phytophthora root and stem rot is a prevalent disease in all soybean producing regions. The pathogen can survive in the soil as resting spores called oospores for many years.

Ag Census Summary on Government Farm Program Payments for Kentucky Counties/Regions

The Ag Census provides data to examine the relative importance of government farm program payments on a state and county level. Over the past two decades, these payments have included traditional farm bill safety net programs such as the Agriculture Risk (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs and previous price/revenue support programs such as Direct and Counter-cyclical Payment Program (DCP) and Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Program) along with conservation payments. These payments have also included ad hoc programs like the Market Facilitation Program (MFP), Coronavirus Food Assistance Program (CFAP), along with Tobacco Transition Payment Program (better known as the "Tobacco Buyout payments)

Regional Beef Cow Slaughter

USDA reports weekly slaughter statistics for different classes of cattle. Beef cow slaughter this year through 28 weeks totals 1.56 million head. Beef cow slaughter has been historically high in the previous two years. During the same period, beef cow slaughter in 2023 and 2022 totaled 1.86 and 2.10 million head, respectively. So far, beef cow slaughter this year reflects a 16 percent decline compared to 2023.

Why Some Producers Complain About Stemmy Orchardgrass Hay

Orchardgrass became the prevalent cool-season grass to include in a mixture with alfalfa more than three decades ago; it replaced smooth bromegrass as the grass species of choice because smooth bromegrass cannot survive the rigor of four cuttings in a growing season. As we learned more about forage quality-animal performance relationships, many producers desired four alfalfa or alfalfa-orchardgrass harvests in a season to obtain higher quality hay for their livestock.

Forage Timely Typs: August

- Continue grazing available summer annuals (millets, sorghum/Sudangrass, crabgrass, etc.).
- Apply 40-60 lb N/A to stimulate summer annual regrowth.
- Clip pastures late June/early July as needed to maintain vegetative growth and to reduce weed seeds, but don't clip lower than 4".
- Identify fescue pastures for stockpiling. Choose pastures that are well drained, have a strong sod, and have not been overgrazed.
- Soil test pastures to determine fertility needs.
- Using UK variety trial results, select varieties to plant in the fall and order seed.
- Use a designated sacrifice lot to feed livestock hay and supplements as needed if drought sets in and no forage
 is available for grazing.



Broccoli and Beef Stir-Fry

1 pound lean beef steak, sliced diagonally across the grain into thin strips

1 tablespoon plus ½ cup stir-fry sauce

1 clove minced garlic

4 tablespoons canola oil, divided

1 medium red onion, cut into ½ inch dice

1 sweet red pepper. cut into ½ inch dice

1 medium yellow

squash, cut into ¼ inch slices

2 cups fresh broccoli florets

1 cup cauliflower florets

1/2 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes

 Combine 1 tablespoon stir-fry sauce and minced garlic in a bowl. Add the beef strips. Let stand 15 minutes.

Heat 1 tablespoon canola oil in a large skillet or wok.

 Add beef and stir fry for one minute. Remove beef from skillet. Heat the remaining 3 tablespoons canola oil in the skillet or wok. Add vegetables. Stir-fry for four minutes or until vegetables are crisp-tender.

6. Add the remaining ½ cup stir-fry sauce and red pepper flakes. Cook and stir 1 to 2 minutes longer, until heated through.

USDA's July Cattle on Feed report was released on Friday July 19th. These monthly reports estimate inventory in US feedlots with one-time capacity exceeding 1,000 head, which represent more than 80% of total on-feed inventory in the United States. The July report is also a quarterly report that includes data on the steer-heifer mix in feedlots. This brief article will walk through last week's report and some of the implications of it.
